## *Pool A*

### Guildford 2 vs. South Wales Dragons 1 (5.2-2.5)

This match was only going to be relevant if White Rose ended up beating Barbican, as then a win for the Dragons would have put them into the Championship pool. Guildford 2 didn't run the risk of finding out whether that would happen, and achieved a 5½-2½ victory: their extra strength in depth showed with wins on the bottom three boards.

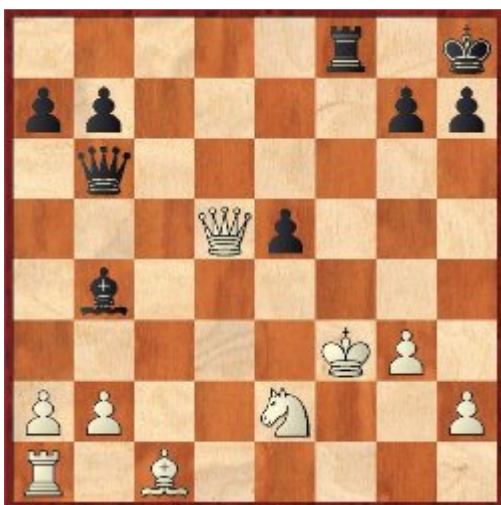

## White Rose 1 vs. Barbican 1 (2.0-6.0)

Barbican's 6-2 win in this match ensured that the previous match would be irrelevant, and that they, along with White Rose and Guildford 2, would carry forward 2 points to the championship pool. Of the four Barbican wins, the best is Devereaux-Palliser, in which the dangers of having an isolated queen's pawn were all too apparent. Meanwhile, the game Wells-Turner was, I suspect, influenced by Wells' notorious time-trouble:

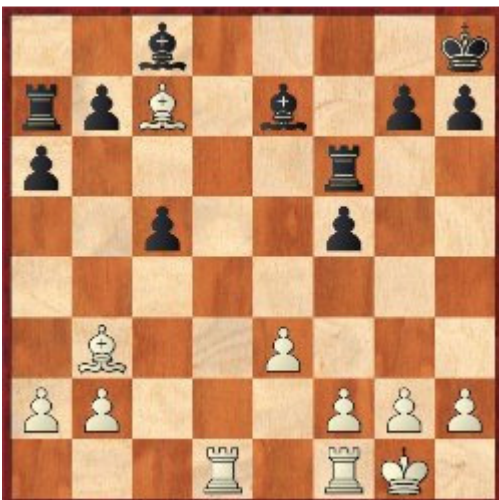


Wells (white, to play) would probably have achieved a draw had he played 31. Rb4. Instead, he attacked the bishop the other way – **31.Rd1?**, and after **31...e5**, there is no way for white to avoid losing material. The game continued **32.Bc6 Rd8 33.Bc7** (better is 33.Bxe5, but white may have missed black's 35<sup>th</sup>) **Bxf2+ 34.Kxf2 Rxd1 35.Bxb6 Rd6**, leaving black the exchange up. White resigned four moves later.

In this, the only certain dead rubber of the round, they said their aim was to draw at least one of their games – in fact, they managed to draw three.



Stephen Gordon, who has just got his final grandmaster norm, was in fine form, beating the Sharks' captain with a neat little finish.

Gordon (white) finished off the game with **26.Bd8**, causing Purton to resign. The mate threats win at least a piece.

## Cambridge University 1 vs. Richmond (5.0-3.0)
